SUBJECT: House Bill 516, Printer's No. 566 - Increasing Minimum Amount of Contract Requiring

Advertising

MUNICIPALITY AND LAW AFFECTED: Act of June 24, 1931, Section 1802 ff; First Class Township Code.

BACKGROUND: The minimum requirements for contracts and purchases by townships to be advertised for competitive bids and to have bonds executed therefore, has been changed periodically by the legislature from \$500 to \$750 to \$1500. A consideration in raising the amount for which a township can contract without advertising and without certain bonding has been that the time involved has prohibited prompt action; competitive bidding may not necessarily bring in the lowest bid; some contractors who would submit a low bid would be discouraged because of the problems and costs of obtaining a bond; and the increasing number of contracts required to be entered into for municipal functions.

ANALAGOUS LAWS: Each municipality has similar requirements for advertising and bonding.

## PROVISIONS:

Purpose: To increase the amount by which municipalities may contract and purchase without advertising and without requiring certain bonds.

Section I (Section 1802): Requires all contracts or purchases made by a first class township involving the expenditure of over \$2500 to be entered into only after meeting advertising requirements. In addition it amends the evasion of advertising requirements provision. This increases the amount from \$1500 to \$2500.

Section 3 (Section 1804): This section requires a bond to be entered into by the successful bidder, in addition to any other bonds required, in a sum not less than 50% or more than 100%, for payment of material men and labor men. Here the amount is raised again from \$1500 to \$2500.

Section 4 (Section 1805): This section also is amended to provide for \$2500 minimum for contracts for erection or alteration of a public building, requiring separate bids and specifications for each type of subcontracting work. This permits each specialty contractor—plumbing, heating, ventilating, and electrical work—to bid separately, rather than to have the entire contract awarded to one person.
