On September 26, 1972, Lt. Col. Dussia was contacted and he indicated that the attachment was not reinstalled in the telephone as was planned. Also, he stated that the investigation thus far has proved negative.

In view of the circumstances, this case is being closed but will be reopened in the event additional assistance is requested by the Pennsylvania State Police.

On September 5, 1972, the Security Office received a report from A. A. Fritz, Supervising Service Foreman, Harrisburg, in reference to a foreign attachment found on the telephone of C. Kapleau, Director of the Milk Control Board, Room #110, Agriculture Building, 2301 N. Cameron Street, Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, telephone number 717 787-4194. The report advised that on September 1, 1972, Joseph Tenetylo, PBX Repairman, responded to a routine trouble report and discovered a foreign attachment wired into the transmission circuit of Mr. Kapleau's Call Director. The attachment was removed without the knowledge of anyone at the Milk Control Board and turned over to Mr. Fritz. Mr. Fritz advised that the unit had been connected in series with the green dial lead with a third wire utilized as an antenna.

On September 5, 1972, the unit was transported to the Security Office for identification and observation disclosed it to be a small black plastic box - (2" x 1 1/2" x 3/4") with three wires approximately 12" long. Tests were conducted in the Security Office and the attachment was determined to be an FM transmitter. The transmitter was then turned over to Mr. B. Bailey, Transmission Engineer for additional examination and testing.

Mr. Bailey later advised that the transmitter contained 2 transistors, 7 resistors, a small integrated circuit board-printed circuit, 2 coils and 4 diodes. The unit operates on approximately 97 megacycles with a range of approximately 1,000 feet. The signal could be picked up on any standard FM receiver.

Due to the circumstances, the case was discussed with higher management within the telephone company and it was decided that the information would be referred to the Governor's Office and the Pennsylvania State Police.

A.M. On September 6, 1972, the Security Agents met with Lt. Col. Dussia, Dep. Comm. of the Pennsylvania State Police, in his office. Frank Ertz, Public Affairs Supervisor, was present at the time the case was discussed. Mr. Ertz stated that the facts were explained to Governor Shapp who expressed the desire that the transmitter be reconnected in the telephone in an attempt to determine the party responsible for installing it initially. The transmitter was turned over to Lt. Col. Dussia who stated he will contact the Security Office in the event assistance is desired.

Lt. Col. Dussia indicated that he will present the details to Mr. Kapleau as he would need his permission prior to reinstalling the unit in his telephone.

An investigation will then be conducted by the Pennsylvania State Police with developments furnished to the Security Office.
