ABORTION LEGISLATION
CONSIDERED BY THE PENNSYLVANIA GENERAL ASSEMBLY 1971-74

A Review and Commentary

During the past four years the General Assembly has considered legislation dealing with abortion. Some of the reasons for this being brought before the legislature are:

1. Pennsylvania law is vague and unclear.
2. Pregnant women and doctors are not sure under what conditions it is possible to conduct a legal abortion.
3. Socio-economic and cultural roles of our society are changing.

During the past four years at least sixteen states have liberalized their abortion laws, and thirteen state courts have struck down restrictive statutes. In January 1973, the United States Supreme Court decision on abortion stated abortions, during the first trimester of pregnancy, are legal for any reason given by the written consent of the mother and her attending physician.

During the past four years the House of Representatives voted on four bills: House Bill 536 (1972), defeated on final passage in the House; House Bill 800 (1972), vetoed by the Governor; Senate Bill 443 (1973), Act No. 78; and Senate Bill 1318 (1974), vetoed by the Governor.

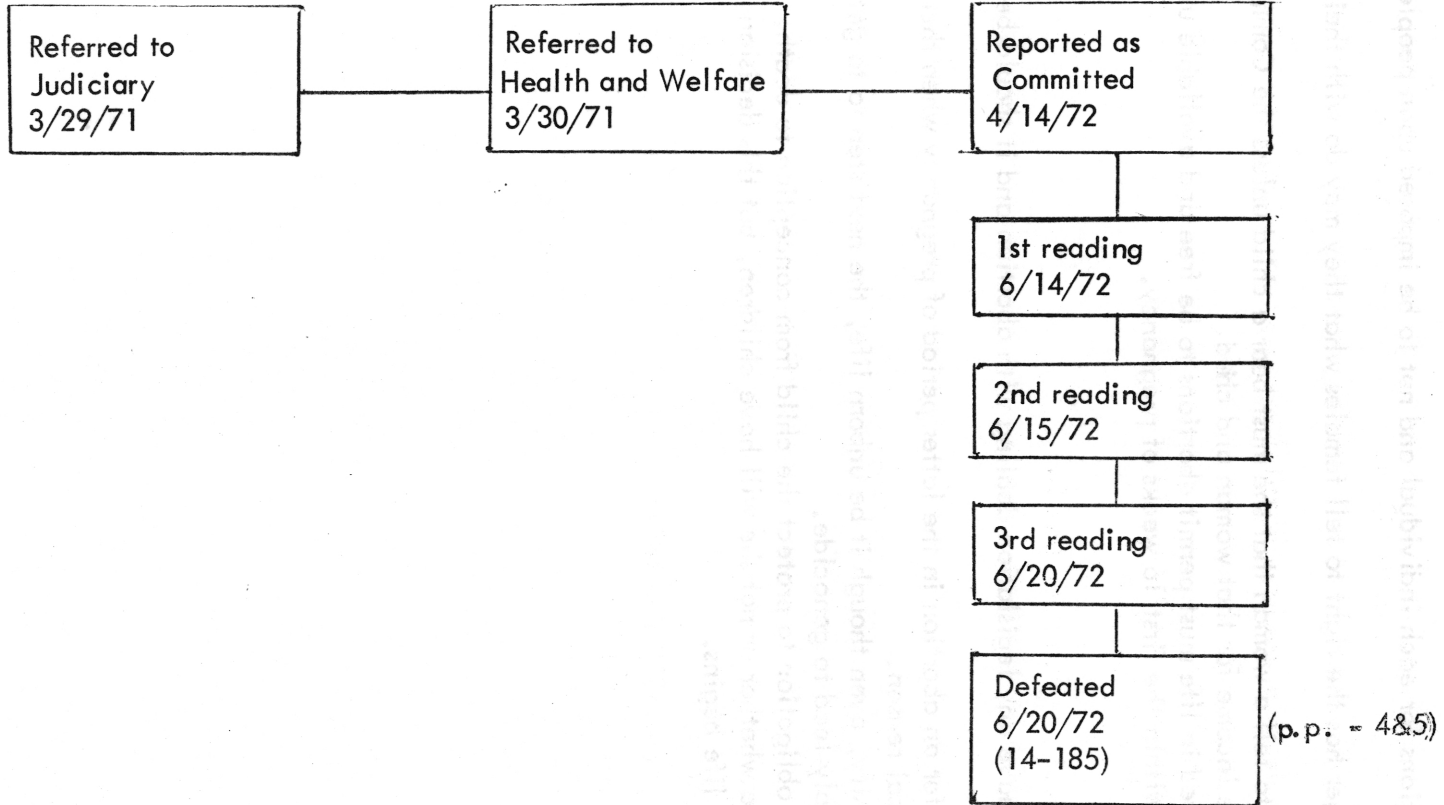
This bill provides for a medically safe abortion provided:

1. The request for an abortion must be made prior to the completion of 16 weeks of pregnancy.
2. Only a physician duly licensed to practice in this Commonwealth can perform an abortion.
3. The abortion must be performed in an accredited hospital or other medical facility.

HOUSE BILL 536, P.N. 588; 6/20/74 (14-185). An Act amending "The Penal Code", approved June 24, 1939 (P.L. 872), further providing for the crime of abortion.

PROS

1. Decision to have an abortion should be made by the woman carrying the fetus, upon conferring with her doctor.
2. Morals and theologies are questions for each individual and not to be imposed upon people by the government.
3. A 95% male legislature no longer has the right to tell females what they may do with their own bodies.
4. General Assembly has no right to tell a woman that she must bear a child unless the Commonwealth can provide an adequate income for that woman and child.
5. Anyone conscientiously interested in life must permit abortions to be free and available under sanitary and proper conditions within the first 16 weeks of pregnancy.

CONS

1. The Commonwealth should not have any legislation dealing with abortion and it should be a private matter.
2. House Bill 536 fails to provide for an abortion in the latter period of pregnancy when there is a compelling and valid medical reason.
3. If we can get rid of life this easily, even though it be unborn life, the next step to to get rid of other life, and thus possibly lead to genocide.
4. The Commonwealth has a legal obligation to protect the child from conception to death.
5. A woman has the right to decide whether or not she will have children, but this decision should be made before the new life begins.

Final Passage

HOUSE BILL 800, P.N. 884; An act amending "The Penal Code", approved June 24, 1939, (P.L. 872), further providing for the crime of abortion and abortion causing death of a pregnant woman.

This bill provides for an abortion in the case that continuation of the pregnancy endangers the life of the woman, providing that:

1. Only a duly licensed physician of the Commonwealth can perform an abortion.
2. The abortion must be performed in an accredited hospital.
3. The woman must have the consent of:
 - a. A "special hospital board".
 - b. Her spouse.
 - c. Her parents if she is under the age of 18.

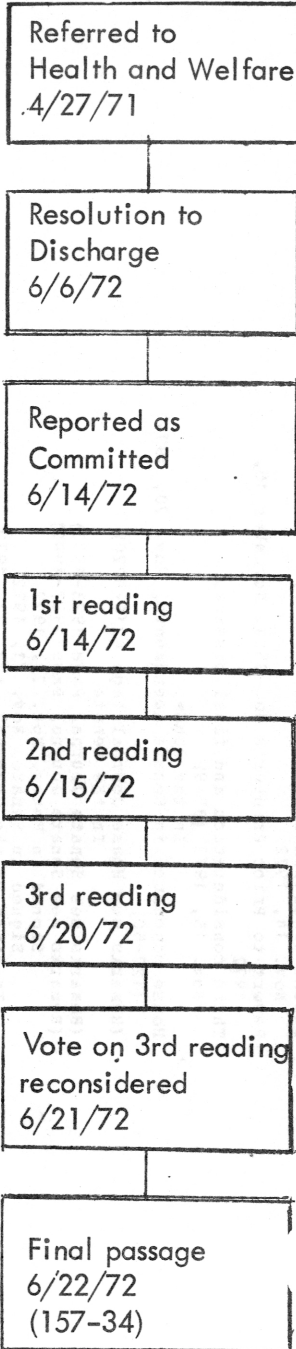

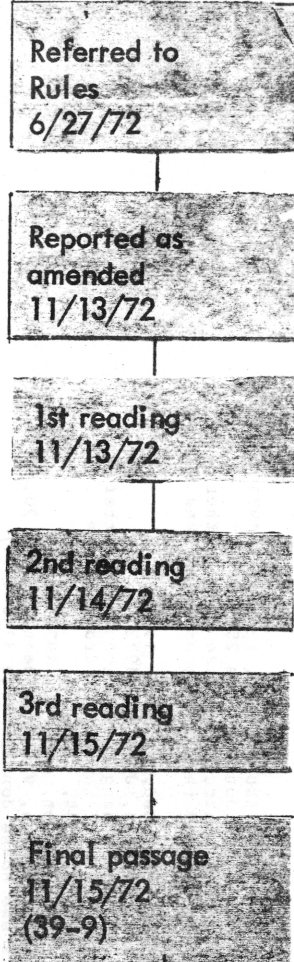

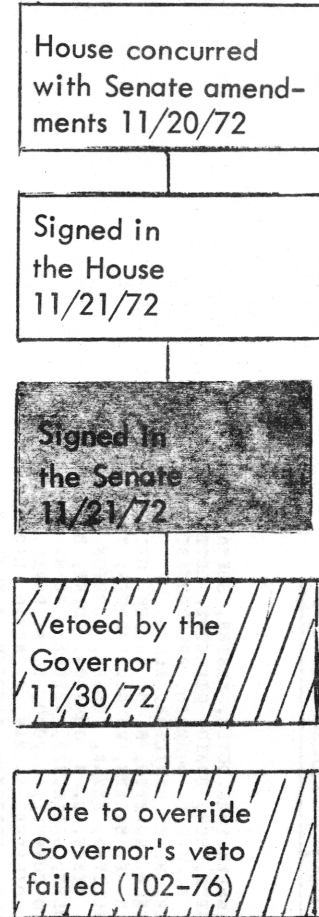

HOUSE BILL 800, P.N. 884; Miller, M.E. amendment, 6/20/72 (54-143). An Act amending the "Penal Code," approved June 24, 1939 (P.L. 872), further providing for the crime of abortion and abortion causing death of a pregnant person. This amendment calls for a referendum.

PROS

1. The referendum would give the House and Senate members an accurate gauge of sentiment.
2. The people of Pennsylvania have the right to express their views.

CONS

1. To add referendum would only cause additional confusion.
2. Public referendum would dilute our legislative responsibilities.
3. The power and the money is so strong on the anti-abortion side that no matter what the public opinion of the State was, it would be overwhelmed in an advertising campaign.
4. A referendum on this issue would rip the State apart.

HOUSE BILL 800, P.N. 884; Gekas' amendment No. 1, 6/20/72 (63-134). Amendment would allow a woman, whose pregnancy resulted from incest, to have a medically safe abortion, provided that the request is made prior to 16 weeks of gestation and that the District Attorney of the judicial district in which the alleged incest has occurred has informed the special hospital board in writing, that there is just cause to believe that the alleged violation did occur.

PROS

1. Nothing can be so horrible as the actual crime of incest.
2. All reason, all decency, all sense of right and wrong seem to cry out.

CONS

1. If we are going to protect the human life of every human being then we can make no exceptions.
2. Persons convicted of incest do not receive the death penalty; therefore, a child born of such company should not receive the death penalty.
3. For the incest inception to this bill to work, it would require on the part of the person who comes forward to admit guilt.

HOUSE BILL 800, P.N. 884; Gekas' amendment No. 2, 6/20/72 (112-87). The following amendment would allow for a "justified medical termination" of the pregnancy of a woman in a fully accredited hospital by a licensed physician upon written certification by all of the members of the special hospital board that continuation of the pregnancy endangers the physical life of the woman.

PROS

1. A pregnancy which endangers the physical life of the woman is a reasonable exception.
2. It is absolutely essential that this amendment be entered so that our Government does not deny a mother the right to live.

CONS

1. There is no need for this amendment because the bill covers this aspect.
2. Physicians are given an opportunity to determine if a mother's life is at stake, there is a possibility they might abuse that discretion.
3. Medical science has advanced beyond the stage of needing an abortion to save a mother's life.
4. No one has the power to make the choice between two human lives.
5. It is a middle-class amendment, and it not equal.
6. This amendment is ambiguous because it asks for consent of one parent, though the parents may be in disagreement.

HOUSE BILL 800, P.N. 884; Gekas' amendment No. 3, 6/20/72 (67-128). Amendment would allow a woman, whose pregnancy resulted from rape, to have a medically safe abortion provided that the request is made prior to 16 weeks of gestation, and the District Attorney of the judicial district in which the alleged rape has occurred has informed the special hospital board in writing, that there is just cause to believe that the alleged violation did occur.

PROS

1. This amendment would allow for a woman whose pregnancy resulted from rape, to secure a legal and medically safe abortion.

CONS

1. In Denver, Colorado, the reporting of rape for the purpose of obtaining an abortion continues to rise.
2. A child born as a result of an act of rape will be sentenced to death, while the perpetrator will have less severe punishment.
3. Mother desiring to get rid of an unwanted child could go to the authorities and say, "I was raped by a person whom I cannot identify".

HOUSE BILL 800, P.N. 3561; An act amending "The Penal Code," approved June 24, 1939 (P.L. 872), further providing for the crime of abortion and abortion causing death of a pregnant woman.

This bill provides for "a justifiable medical termination" in the case that continuation of the pregnancy endangers the life of the woman providing that:

1. Only a licensed physician of the Commonwealth can perform an abortion.
2. The abortion must be performed in an accredited hospital.
3. The woman must have the consent of the "special hospital board."

SENATE BILL 443, P.N. 788; An act amending the Act of October 27, 1955 (P.L. 744, No. 222), allowing a person to refuse to participate in an abortion and prohibiting discriminatory practices relating to such refusal.

This bill makes it a misdemeanor to:

1. Deny admission into a medical or nursing school for refusing to participate in an abortion.
2. Refuse promotions or wage increases for refusing to participate in an abortion.

No hospital or person shall be required to admit any patient for the purpose of performing an abortion which would result in the termination of a pregnancy.

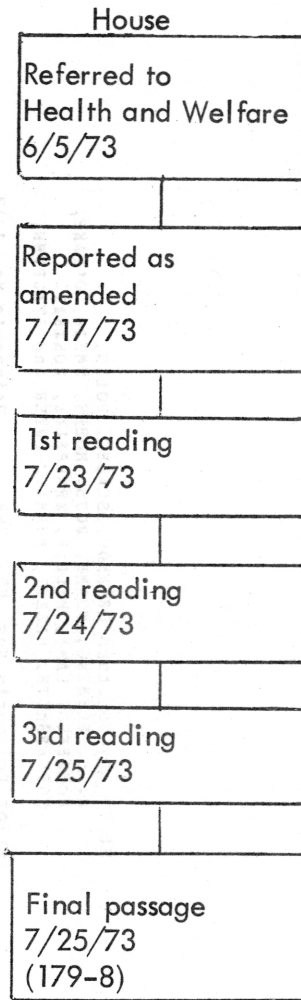
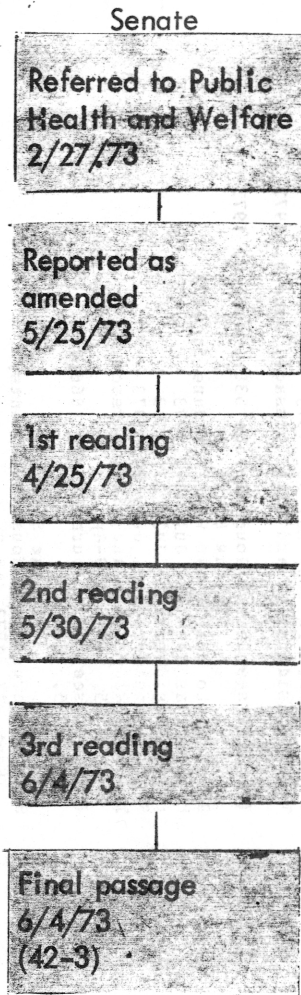

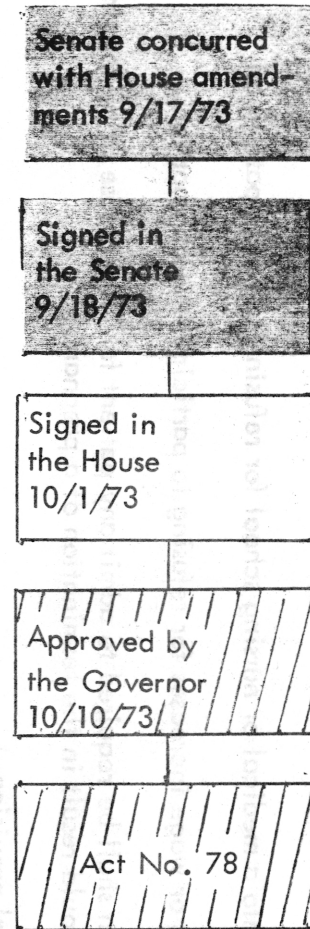

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SENATE BILL 443, P.N. 788 and 1217

In Senate Bill 443, P.N. 788, a medical facility and its staff members were included in the same protection clause; whereas, P.N. 1217 places the protection of medical facilities in one subsection and the protection of staff personnel in another subsection. Therefore, there is better legal protection for both medical personnel and medical facilities. P.N. 1217 permits a physician to perform or refuse to perform an abortion without recrimination, and a medical facility may allow or refuse to allow its facilities to be used for an abortion without recrimination.

SENATE BILL 443, P.N. 1217; passed 7/25/73 (179-8). Approved by the Governor, October 10, 1973, Act No. 78. An Act amending the Act of October 27, 1955 (P.L. 744, No. 222), entitled as amended, "Pennsylvania Human Relations Act", protecting the right of hospitals and individuals not to engage in abortion or sterilization and providing against discriminating practices in respect to abortion and sterilization.

PROS

1. No hospital with a stated code of ethics would refuse to treat a woman for an injury or a disease unrelated to pregnancy.
2. If in course of a treatment for an injury or a disease, the life of the fetus is taken, no Catholic hospital would refuse to perform treatment on a woman and allow her to die.
3. In a society such as ours, each religious or ethnic group must have the right to have its own institutions and run them as it sees fit.
4. To the extent that these institutions receive tax exemptions and other benefits, they must be open to all of us in an emergency situation.

CONS

1. If a woman who may be 7 or 8 months pregnant is injured in an accident and taken to the nearest hospital, which may very well be a Catholic hospital, they do not have to perform an abortion.
2. This type of "ethical" logic could be applied to almost any aspect of medical care.

HEALTH AND WELFARE HEARING ON SENATE BILL 443; conducted by the Health and Welfare Committee, July 12, 1973.

PROS

1. This bill articulates the First Amendment guarantee of the free exercise of religion for health care facilities and health care personnel.
2. This bill will protect individuals who perform or refuse to perform abortions or sterilization.
3. Bill provides no school will be permitted to discriminate against students in the admissions process because of objection to abortion and sterilization.
4. Bill allows freedom of choice of members of the Health Care Industry and provides appropriate safeguards.

CONS

1. The obvious effect of this bill is to discriminate against citizens in the middle and lower income brackets.
2. Medical facilities cannot be permitted to bar the use of a facility from any medical or surgical procedure which the attending physician deems necessary.
3. Bill permits the legislature to impose its non-medical judgement upon the medical schools and boards of the Commonwealth.
4. Bill gives a hospital a conscience.
5. If the corporation opposes abortion, then no medical personnel can participate in one.

SENATE BILL 443, P.N. 1217; An act amending the act of October 27, 1935 (P.L. 744, No. 222), to protect health care facilities from liability for refusing to perform or refusal to allow the performance of an abortion or sterilization.

This bill makes it a misdemeanor to:

1. Take punitive action against any health care facility who objects to abortion or sterilization.
2. Take punitive action against any employee who objects to abortion or sterilization.
3. Deny admission into a medical or nursing school for refusal to participate in an abortion.

This section does not apply to health care facilities operated exclusively for the performance of abortion or sterilization.

SENATE BILL 1318, P.N. 1885; An act regulating abortions; providing requirements relating to consent, and protection of premature infants aborted alive; limiting the subsidizing of abortions; providing for the powers and duties of the Department of Health; and prescribing penalties.

Rules and Guidelines for the performing of an abortion are:

1. Informed consent of the woman.
2. Written consent of the spouse.
3. Written consent of a parent, if the woman is under 18 and unmarried.

Courts, executive officers, administrative agencies, or public employees can not force anyone to have or not to have an abortion.

It is second degree murder to intentionally kill a premature infant aborted alive.

It is first degree misdemeanor for anyone:

1. intending to perform an abortion not to have first made a positive determination of pregnancy
2. to receive remuneration for referring anyone to an abortion

Facilities must keep records that will be treated confidentially.

Solicitation or advertising is prohibited.

Abortions may not be subsidized through governmental funds unless it is necessary to preserve the life and health of the woman.

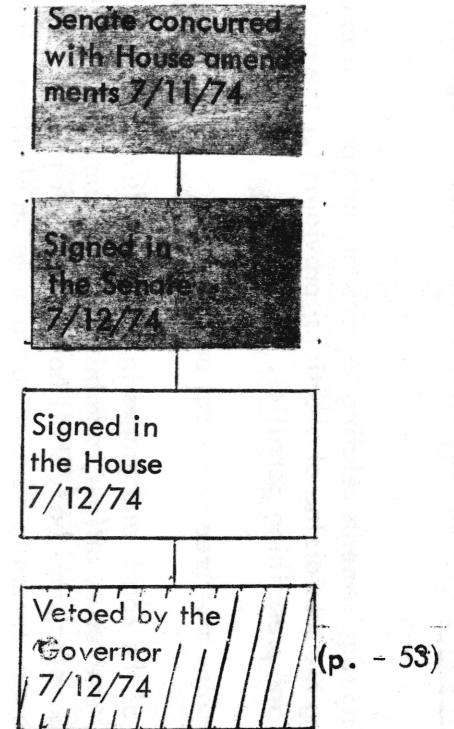
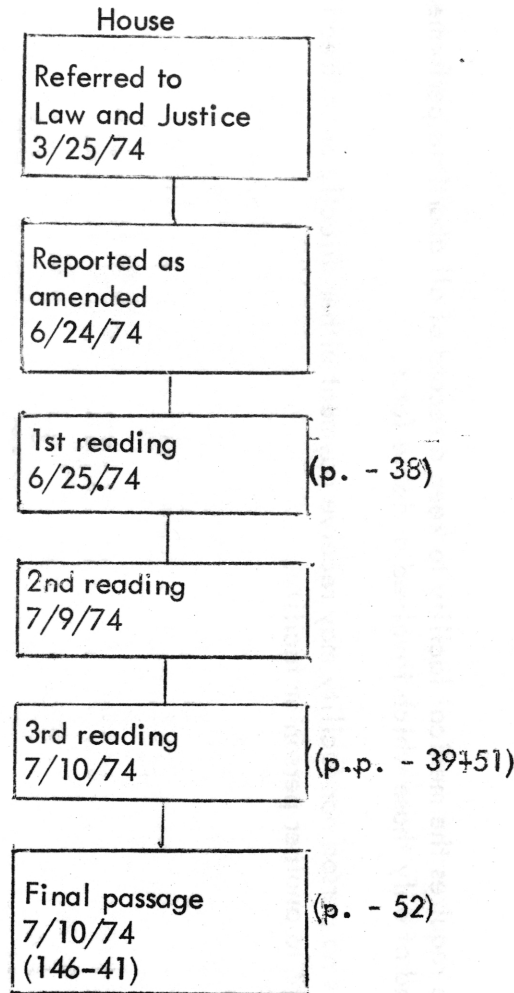
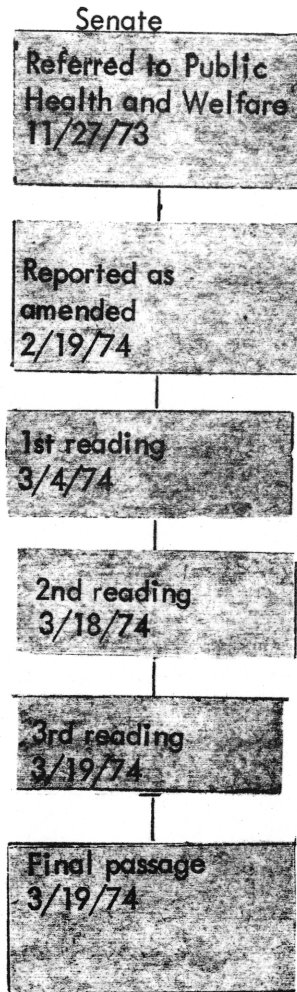

SENATE BILL 1318, P.N.'s 1958 and 2311, first consideration in the House of Representatives on June 25, 1974.

An act regulating abortions; providing requirements relating to consent, and protection of premature infants aborted alive; limiting the subsidizing of abortions; providing for the powers and duties of the Department of Health; and prescribing penalties.

The differences between the two versions are three technical amendments.

The first change deals with the role of the courts and judges in dealing with abortions. In Printer's No. 1958 no court, judge, executive officer, administrative agency or public employee of the Commonwealth or of a local governmental body shall have the power to issue any order requiring an abortion or shall coerce any person to have or not to have an abortion. However, Printer's No. 2311 deletes court and judge; therefore, they are not prohibited from interfering with an abortion.

The second change requires the medical facility to keep a record of all abortions performed on the premises instead of only those which involved a viable fetus.

The third stipulates no person nor facility may receive payment either directly or indirectly for referral of a patient to another person or facility.

SENATE BILL 1318, P.N. 2311; Gekas' amendment, first half failed 7/10/74 (59-125), second half failed 7/10/74 (33-150). The first allows a woman to secure an abortion without consent of her spouse, or if under the age of eighteen she need not have her parents' consent. The second deletes the clause that no public funds will be paid to anyone who secures an unneeded and unnecessary abortion. Parents' consent is not needed.

PROS

1. Bill with this amendment, would conform to the Supreme Court ruling.
2. Amendment conforms with Florida court ruling that husband's consent isn't necessary.
3. Abortion is cheaper than making a woman have a child.
4. Women shouldn't be forced to bear children, but if the state doesn't subsidize abortions for welfare recipients, the government is forcing women to have unwanted children.
5. Bill is unfair without amendment, because the poor can't afford to pay for an abortion.

CONS

1. Amendment would not protect the life of the fetus.
2. Adolescents are not mature enough to make the decision on abortion.
3. Husband has the right to help determine if their child should be aborted.
4. Mother on welfare have an unwanted child can place the child in an adoption agency.
5. Welfare monies are to be used to help life, not condemn it.

Exemptions from the above regulation: a legal relative of the recipient of the services, an insurance carrier, designated by the recipient of the services, a hospital on behalf of an in-patient or out-patient of such hospital, an industrial firm only for its own employees, a trade union health facility only for its own registered patients, governmental agencies and their specified public or private agent, agency or organization on behalf of the recipient of the services.

PROS

1. Amendment would protect the medical facilities of trade unions and industrial firms that provide abortion services.
2. Amendment would protect any government agency that provided any type of abortion services.

CONS

1. Amendment is unfair and biased because it would not give all abortion services the same equal protection.

SENATE BILL 1318, P.N. 2311; An act regulating abortions, providing requirements relating to consent, and protection of premature infants aborted alive; limiting the subsidizing of abortions; providing for the powers and duties of the Department of Health; and prescribing penalties.

Rules and Guidelines for the performing of an abortion are:

1. **Informed consent (written) of the woman.**
2. **Physician must explain in writing and orally the foreseeable physical and psychological consequences.**
3. **Written consent of spouse.**
4. **Written consent of a parent if she is under the age of 18 and unmarried.**

Executive officers, administrative agencies or public employees can not force anyone to have or not have an abortion.

It is Second Degree Murder to intentionally kill a premature infant aborted alive.

It is First Degree misdemeanor:

1. **For anyone intending to perform an abortion not to have first made a positive determination of pregnancy.**
2. **To perform an abortion during the stage subsequent to viability except to preserve the life or health of the mother.**

SENATE BILL 1318, P.N. 2311; Governor's veto message 7/12/74.

1. As Governor of this Commonwealth I have sworn to uphold the Constitution of the United States and of the Commonwealth. When a Bill containing clearly unconstitutional language is presented to me, I have a duty to veto it.
2. The Supreme Court of the United States issued an opinion which clearly stated that with regard to the first trimester of pregnancy the decision as to whether or not to have an abortion is to be made by the attending physician in consultation with his patient. Interference by the State in this decision was specifically forbidden.
3. Senate Bill 1318 clearly violates the Supreme Court's decision, and thus the United States Constitution by authorizing husbands or parents to force a woman to continue a pregnancy beyond the first trimester despite her decision and that of her physician to terminate the pregnancy.
4. The General Assembly has a responsibility to review carefully decisions of the United States Supreme Court before drawing up a Bill. Only then could I be in a position to sign such legislation.
