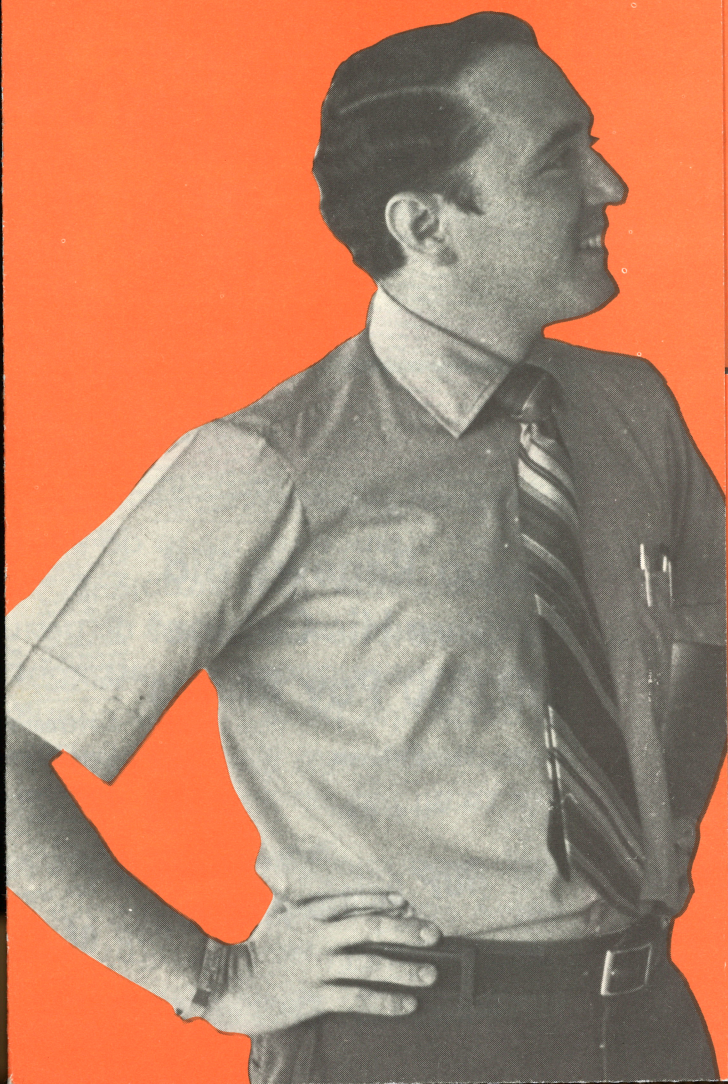

Shapp Administration So Far: More Promise Than Performance

It is hardly surprising that Governor Shapp, in his State of the State address to the General Assembly, has looked upon his handiwork during his first year in office and found it good. What else would you expect of a governor—or, for that matter, a President?

And in one way, at least, the state is in far better shape. The Shapp Administration fiscal crisis, that crisis of the heavens, behind which the administration has revenues enabling it to pay the bills—indeed, probably more than it needs for this fiscal year. And since this is a political year, it is also hardly surprising that the assembled legislators had their next hearing the governor's budget in late March, "with budget, and no new taxes."

But to obtain his revenues, Mr. Shapp had to stretch his campaign promise — shall we say — to stretch his campaign promise to not sign any tax bill which did not at the same time provide tax reform.

The governor concedes this by implication in calling on the legislature to take the first step toward getting an amendment on the ballot to permit a graduated income tax.

"We will never have true tax reform in this state — not tax relief needed by the archaic and the consumer — until we amend the archaic and the consumer — no mean accomplishment, other than the temporary (we trust) solution to the fiscal problem — no mean accomplishment, we believe — in the administration," he said.

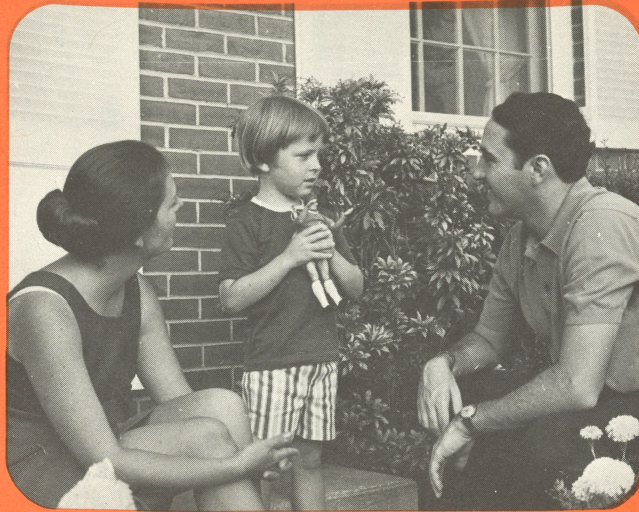
A PERSONAL SKETCH
