

After we get comsons o.K. then take it to Down



Upon review and discussion of the draft legislation with the Perry County Warden some initial questions that he has brought to the table need to be answered involves the jurisdiction of the Department of Public Welfare-- is the DPW going to monitor and inspect 'prison facilities' housing said juveniles and are these 'prison facilities' going to have to adhere to DPW rules and regulations affecting juveniles?? If the DPW is going to be the governing agency, will the 'prison facilities' have to provide 'specially trained' staff to supervise the juveniles and to provide educational instruction to the juveniles plus will the 'prison facilities' be permitted to 'lockdown' juvenile inmates??

Questions relating specifically to the draft include:

- *Objection To Possiblity Of Placing A ' ...Child Alleged to Have Committed A...Summary Offense'
- Adult Prison Facility Already Conforts Limitations When Dealing With Adults Who Commit <u>Summary Offense</u> (i.e. Cannot Strip Search)
- *Definition Is Needed As To Whether A 'Time Limitation' Exist Or Does Not Exist
- -Appears Open Ended With Language 'While Awaiting Space In A Juvenile Detention Center'
- *Objection To Language That Places Responsibility Upon The 'Prison Facility' Administrator To' ...Bring Him (Juvenile) Before The Court Upon Request Or <u>Deliver</u> Him To A Detention Or Shelter Care Facility...'
- Juvenile Probation Authorities Should Handle Such Cases

SUBJECT:

Reintroduction of Legislation - Juvenile Detention

In the very near future, I will be reintroducing legislation (previously H.B. 1622) aimed at permitting a juvenile to be housed within a county correctional facility under very limited circumstances. This legislation is necessary because only 20 of the 67 counties in Pennsylvania have their own Juvenile Detention Centers. Of the remaining counties, 14 have contracts allowing them to use space within the 20 existing facilities and 33 counties have no contracts nor any guaranteed juvenile detention bed spaces. The need for juvenile bed space within these 33 counties is real and urgent given the current explosion across Pennsylvania in juvenile court cases.

Under this legislation an adjudicated delinquent juvenile could be housed in a county correctional facility only when:

- 1. there is an immediate and urgent necessity to detain the child; and
- 2. the offense the child is charged with involved physical harm or the threat of physical harm to the victim; and
- 3. there is a need to ensure the court appearance of the child and there is reason to believe that the child may abscond; and
- 4. there is no parent or responsible adult willing and able to assume responsibility; and
- 5. other resources have been tried and have been proven unsuccessful; and
- 6. the child will be separated by sight and sound from incarcerated adult offenders; and
- 7. the child will be under continuous visual supervision of staff; and
- 8. the child will be placed in the first available juvenile detention space within a reasonable distance or contiguous space.

I believe that this legislation strikes the proper balance between the law enforcement and safety needs of the community and the proper protection of a juvenile offender.
