ch Shull spirit. **Remarks to graduates of Triangle Tech**

Thank you very much for the opportunity to speak to you this evening.

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But I also challenge you to find personal and spiritual success.

What will make you content?

What will make you happy?

What will feed your soul?

As you graduate tonight, you need to ponder these questions, as well as "Where will I work," "What kind of job will I do?" and "How much will I earn?"

Your degree provides you with clues – and a head start – on answering these kinds of questions.

Your life experiences – and the people who have shaped those experiences – provide you with the clues to answer the other questions.

Somewhere in your gut right now, if you are honest with yourself, you know there are people who made a huge difference in your life at a critical time just by being there for you -- by listening, by offering support, by saying a kind word, even by offering constructive criticism.

I want all of you to think of those people right now.

That thought is the most important thing I want to leave you with tonight – along with this challenge:

As you work hard in your new career, prosper financially, and become a success, don't forget to take the opportunity to become one of those people you are thinking about right now.

Treat everyone with respect, even those who don't agree with you.

Listen and offer constructive suggestions when someone needs help.

Set your own concerns and problems aside long enough to help someone else with their load of troubles.

Be compassionate to other people.

If you can meet that challenge, it doesn't really matter how you meet the career challenge.

If you meet that challenge, you can be a state representative, a nurse, an accountant, a welder, or the person who picks up the garbage on the curb and throws it into the truck, and still make a difference in your community and the lives of others every single day.

Take the skills you learned at Triangle Tech, apply

them in the world of work, and it is more than just likely that what you do from here on out will make you happy.

But take the lessons you have learned from those around you who have had a profound impact on bringing you to this point in life, combine those lessons with those you learned here, and I promise that what you do from here on out will also make others happy.

In our society today, one is just as important, if not more important, than the other.

I wish you all of the success, happiness and contentment that your new career brings you.

And, I hope to one day to hear about all of the success, happiness and contentment each of you has given to others.
