House Opens 173rd Session Under New Leadership

The 173rd Session of the House of Representatives was gavelled into existence on January 3, 1989, opening a new era of leadership within the House as well as the Democratic Caucus.

Sworn into office were 202 representatives—including 27 new members, 14 of them Democrats (see pages two and three). One House seat remains empty, and must be filled by special election.

For the fourth consecutive term, House Democrats have retained the majority, allowing them to set legislative priorities and policies, as well as name the chairmen of 23 standing House committees (see below, page four).

The opening day also was a special one for state Rep. James J. Manderino, D-Westmoreland, who was elected Speaker of the House to highlight a career in public service spanning more than two decades.

Manderino, a member of the House since 1967, has served in leadership positions for more than a decade. He served as Majority Leader in 1977-78 and from 1983 through 1988, and also was Democratic Whip from 1979 to 1982.

Louise Williams Bishop (D-192, Phila.) is an ordained Baptist Evangelist minister and 30-year Philadelphia radio personality. Her extensive service to the community and youth has earned her honors from the City of Philadelphia, as the Operation PUSH/Jesse Jackson "Woman of the Year", as well as numerous church and radio awards. She is the mother of four children.



Anthony L. Colaizzo (D-48, Washington) has an extensive record of public service in his home county. He has founded his own insurance, real estate, and income tax business, and has served as Canonsburg property tax collector and vice chairman of the Washington County Democratic Party. He is past president of the Washington County Non-Profit Housing Authority, the Chamber of Commerce, and the Jaycees. He also has served as vice president of the Greater Canonsburg Area Economic Development Committee, as a member of the county Redevelopment Authority, and as chairman of the Local Government Study Commission, and has been heavily involved in local health care advancement. A Duquesne University graduate, he is a U.S. Army veteran of the Korean Conflict. He is married and the father of four and grandfather of two.



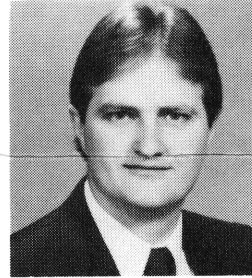
Frank J. Gigliotti (D-22, Allegheny) has worked for a number of years for the City of Pittsburgh, having risen from a heavy equipment operator to Superintendent of Public Works. He also has been involved in restaurant management. He has served on the board of the Brookline Area Community Council, and as a political coordinator and chairman for the city's 19th Ward. He is married and the father of three children.



Harold James (D-186, Phila.), a former Philadelphia police officer, has been executive member on the Public Interest Law Center of Philadelphia; co-chairman, Criminal Justice Task Force of the Philadelphia Urban Coalition; founder and chairman, Black Coalition of Service Organizations; president of the Guardian Civic League; and state and national delegate for the Fraternal Order of Police. He has been regional chairman, board member, and national chairman of the National Black Police Association, and has been



widely honored by the city and police department, plus various police organizations, for his community service and heroism in the line of duty. He earned a certificate in police science, an associate degree in criminal justice, and a bachelors degree in sociology from Temple University. He studied at the Philadelphia School of Law in 1981 and 1982, and is a U.S. Army veteran.



Ralph Kaiser (D-41, Allegheny) is a graduate of Robert Morris College, and most recently was employed as fiscal control supervisor for Allegheny County's Department of Engineering and Construction. He has been an elected councilman in Brentwood Borough, and is past president of his parish school's parent-teacher guild and a former school board member. He is married and the father of two children.



Susan Laughlin (D-16, Beaver) is a native of Ambridge. She is a member of the Beaver County Democratic Women's Club, Christian Mothers, and the Fraternal Order of Eagles. She was long involved in political and governmental matters during her 36-year marriage to the late Charles P. Laughlin, former legislator from the 16th Legislative District and chairman of the House Consumer Affairs Committee. She is the mother of a son, and has two grandsons.



Christopher K. McNally (D-36, Allegheny) is a Pittsburgh native and lawyer. He is a Penn State graduate in political science, and earned a law degree from the University of Pittsburgh School of Law. He has been active in the South Pittsburgh Economic Revitalization Team, the Overbrook Community Council, the Arlington Civic Council, the Urban League of Pittsburgh, and Drywall Finishers Local 2006. He is married and the father of one child.



William R. Robinson (D-19, Allegheny), a political scientist, has had a career of public service with the City of Pittsburgh, where he served on City Council for eight years. He has been a trustee of the Carnegie Library and Carnegie Institute, a delegate to the

Democratic Mini-Convention in 1978, and was a member of the Rules Committee of the Allegheny County Democratic Committee, as well as the Pennsylvania and National League of Cities. He holds bachelors and masters degrees in political science respectively from Ohio State University and Duquesne University, and attended the Howard University Law School. He is the father of two children.

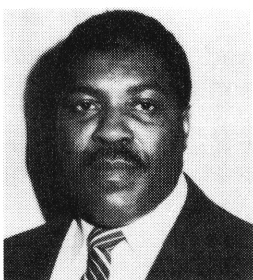
Thomas J. Scrimenti (D-4, Erie) has the distinction of having been elected, at age 19, one of the youngest school directors in the state. In 1982, he was elected to his first of two terms as mayor of North East, becoming the youngest mayor in the U.S. and the first Democratic mayor of North East in over 100 years. He is past chairman and remains a member of the Senior Citizen Health Care Council of Erie County. He holds a bachelors degree in criminal justice from Gannon University.



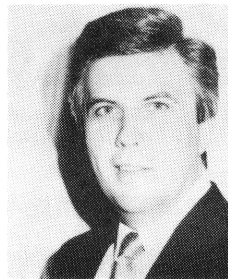
Thomas A. Tangretti (D-57, Westmoreland) comes to the House after serving two terms as Westmoreland County Controller. Prior to holding elective office he was Director of Administration for Mark Lines, Inc., having previously served as an administrative assistant to former Congressman John H. Dent for ten years in both the Washington, D.C., and Greensburg offices. A native of Jeannette, he is a graduate of Indiana University of Pennsylvania, and earned a masters degree in public administration from the University of Pittsburgh. He is the father of two children.



W. Curtis Thomas (D-181, Phila.) is a lawyer and community activist. He is a graduate of Temple University (B.S., secondary education), where he also earned graduate credits in secondary school administration. A graduate of Antioch School of Law, Washington, D.C., his affiliations have included co-chairmanship of the Leadership Committee of the Philadelphia Urban Coalition, and chairman of the Coalition's Economic Development Task Force. He also has been on the board of the Consumer Federation of America. A strong advocate for youth, he was the



primary organizer of Philadelphia's first city-wide gang control agency, a successful summer job program and a training program for juvenile offenders, truants, and dropouts. He also was instrumental in developing a range of programs to spur economic development and housing.



Leo J. Trich, Jr. (D-47, Washington) worked for 15 years as a national youth sports administrator, including a four-year term on the U.S. Olympic Committee. He has been a Washington City Councilman, executive assistant to the Washington County Board of Commissioners, and has served on the staff of a U.S. Congressman. In November 1987, he was appointed by Gov. Robert Casey as District Administrator of the Department of Revenue. He attended California State University of Pennsylvania and Washington-Jefferson College. He is married and the father of three children.



Thomas B. Stish (D-116, Luzerne) has worked as a guidance counselor and school psychologist. Prior to this service he was a caseworker manager for the Luzerne County Bureau for the Aging, serving the needs of the elderly in the Hazleton area. Rep. Stish is past chairman of the Hazleton Democratic Party and past member of the lower Luzerne County Democratic Executive Committee. Among his affiliations he has served on the board of Luzerne Community College. He is a graduate of Mining Mechanical Institute, and earned a degree in psychology from Penn State, and degrees in counseling psychology and school psychology from Kutztown and Lehigh Universities.



Anthony Hardy Williams (D-191, Phila.), a graduate of Franklin and Marshall College, Lancaster, has served an internship with the office of Congressman Ronald Dellums, D-California, and was nominated to serve as a White House Fellow. He has been a research analyst for Acumenics Research and Technology, Inc., a Washington, D.C.-based minority firm with offices in Philadelphia, and worked for the Pepsi Cola Bottling Corp. in Philadelphia and New York as district manager and regional manager. At the time of his election he was in business for himself as president of a vending company. He is involved with Black Men in Motion, the Philadelphia Council of Elders, and serves on the board of Black Family Services. He is the son of state Sen. Hardy Williams, a former member of the Pennsylvania House of Representatives.
