I am writing in regard to a situation that was recently brought to my attention involving a senior citizen who was denied free bus service from Albion to Erie.

The woman had taken the bus from Erie to Albion to visit her sister-in-law for the day. This particular route to Albion is run only one day a week. Upon catching the last bus back to Erie at 4:00 p.m., she was told that the ride would cost \$3.00 because her senior citizen's card was not valid after 3:30 p.m. Since she did not have \$3.00 with her, she had to exit the bus and call a family member in Erie to drive to Albion to pick her up.

While I understand the need to discourage free bus service during specified peak hours (3:30 p.m. to 6:30 p.m., Monday through Friday), common sense and extraordinary consideration should prevail under certain circumstances. If no bus service back to Erie was going to be available until the following week, certainly some consideration should have been extended to this senior citizen.

Given that the routes in the rural areas are run only on a very limited basis, I am requesting that the policy be reviewed and changed in these rural areas. In addition, please ensure that the rules and regulations governing the use of the senior citizens' cards are clearly explained to every person possessing such a card. Finally, I would hope that EMTA bus drivers will be instructed to use their common sense and their best judgment in regard to such situations.

I am well aware that the amount of money needed to enjoy the benefits of the LIFT Program is often beyond the ability of many of my disabled constituents to afford. Many of these constituents are ineligible, by reason of age or some other factor, for programs that defray these costs for other elderly or disabled persons. Senate Bill 1066 may provide a remedy for that situation. Dear Representative Scrimenti:

I am writing on behalf of the persons with disabilities in Erie County, who lack adequate funding to allow them to utilize the available transportation. Erie County is fortunate to have the LIFT Transportation Program. Unfortunately, there are many members of the county who do not utilize the LIFT because they can not afford it.

Senior citizens over the age of sixty-five have the benefit of the Lottery Program which subsidizes 85% of the cost of their rides on the LIFT. Persons with disabilities who live within the EMTA bus routes have the availability of using EMTA transit services or LIFT paratransit services under the ADA complimentary paratransit program. Those with Medical ACCESS cards have the availability of free transportation to medical appointments via the Medical Assistance Transportation Program.

These programs all are very beneficial to those who qualify but unfortunately, there are many in our county that "fall through the cracks." They do not meet the criteria for any of these programs and thus don't have access to affordable transportation. For a customer in Corry to use LIFT into Erie who has no subsidy, the trip could cost them as much as \$40.00 each way or more. If a subsidy program was available to them such as the Lottery Program is available to senior citizens, this trip would cost the customer only \$6.00 each way.

We urge you to please support SB1066 when it comes to the House and pass the Affordable Shared Ride Bill for People with Disabilities by May 2000. There are many persons with disabilities who have the ability and the desire to be more active productive members of our community. They need affordable access to transportation to enable them to do this. Thank you for your support.



Moreover, I am pleased to announce that I have co-sponsored House Bill 1426, which was referred to the House Local Government Committee on May 4, 1999. If and when this bill comes before the entire House for debate and a vote, please know I will support it in its present form.

Thank you very much for taking the time to contact me regarding your interest in long-term care coverage as health care reform plans are discussed in the State Legislature.

Currently, the House Health and Welfare Committee and the House Appropriations Committee are considering and debating the managed care plan, the "pay or play" plan, the universal access proposal, the small business health insurance plan, plus numerous other amendments to Pennsylvania's laws which affect our health care system. Of course, providing for adequate and responsible long-term care is a crucial discussion point of all of these plans.

In addition, the House is looking at measures to nursing home care, including community care programs that allow older persons to stay in their homes longer while saving the state money.

There are many different views on the proper scope of government involvement in health care. Many of the proposed changes to the system can be complicated in their scope and detail. However, everyone does agree that the health care system, specifically the long-term care is facing a crisis situation and something must be done to correct this problem.

It is worth noting that Senator Raphael Musto recently introduced legislation which would give senior citizens a voice on health care issues by creating the Commission on Health Care for the Aging. The Commission would have the responsibility of reviewing nursing home care and long-term care policy. Also, the Commission would examine universal health care coverage to determine if seniors already covered by Medicare should be included in universal health care coverage proposals.

Presently, I am reviewing all health care proposals. You can be assured that I will remember the needs of long-term care as health care reform plans are deliberated in the House.

Again, thank you for your inquiry. Please know that your comments, ideas and recommendations are welcomed at any time. If you should have any questions or would like more information, please feel free to contact me.

I am writing you to warn you of an important problem, that if not fixed could severely affect nursing home residents and nursing home associates like myself.

The state Department of Public Welfare, this year, has changed the way it pays nursing homes that care for residents in the Medicaid program. As an associate of Western Reserve Health and Rehabilitation Center, I can tell you that the greatest part of our residents were either already in the Medicaid program when they arrived at our facility or are in the Medicaid program now.

Under the way that payments are made now, called case-mix reimbursement, facilities like ours will receive less money from the state. You certainly know what has happed to the hospitals after they started getting less money to provide for good patient care! Many jobs went out the window and I am worried that the same thing will happen to nursing homes.

I also know that if facilities like ours are compelled to make due with less, the quality of the care we provide for our residents could suffer.

As an elected official, if there is anything you can do to correct this problem so nobody suffers, I would urge you do it immediately. If your parents were in a nursing home I am sure you would want that facility to be able to provide the best care possible.
