The unfortunate death of Senator Edwin C. Ewing has created a vacancy in the newly formed 37th District which he served so capably.

The procedure for filling the vacancy is through a special election held at the call of the Lieutenant Governor. Due to time factors and Constitutional requirements, the election will not be held until some time in the fall.

The Party candidates will not be selected through the medium of a Primary Election, but rather the nominee of each party will be chosen by the elected Committee people from the 37th Senatorial District. After the call of the Lieutenant Governor, the Republican Committee people from the 37th Senatorial District will convene in a meeting called by the County Chairman.

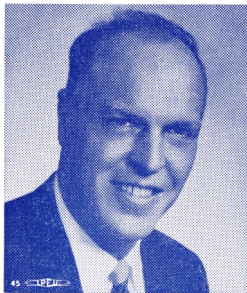

The choice will then be yours.

Dear Constituent:

On the ballot with such very important offices as President and Vice President is the local position of Representative in the State House of Representatives.

I am running for my sixth term. In asking for your vote I feel I should tell you what I have been doing and what I believe.

As you know seniority determines committee priorities. As eleventh on the seniority list, I have received more responsible committee assignments, as follows:

State Government: Chairman
Education
Committee on Committees
Professional Licensure
Appropriations

The result has been a very, very busy year, particularly as Chairman of the State Government Committee. The Chairman has to analyze the bills, discuss them with sponsors -- and opponents, plan for committee meetings and be prepared to explain each bill. Most committees meet three or four times; however, the State Government Committee had thirty-seven meetings. The average number of bills per committee is about twenty-five; our committee had over three hundred. I worked harder but enjoyed this past session more than any before.

I have introduced and tried to have passed (in many cases successfully), a number of what I hope you consider worthwhile and constructive pieces of legislation. A partial list of the bills sponsored by me is attached, along with some comments of mine that have been the basis of my speeches at the various meetings.

It was gratifying to be recognized and endorsed by both Pittsburgh papers but the endorsement that really counts is your vote on November 5th. I hope you feel I merit it.

Dear Constituent:

At long last the 1967 Legislative Session is over. In many respects it has been a difficult and frustrating year with results that satisfied no one -- there was just too much politics.

In other respects, it has, for me, been a most interesting year. As you know, seniority determines committee assignments. As 13th on the seniority list, I have received more responsible committee assignments, as follows:

State Government: Chairman
Education
Committee on Committees
Cities-Counties, 2nd Class (Allegheny)
Professional Licensure
Appropriations

The result has been a very, very busy year, particularly as Chairman of the State Government Committee. Most committees meet three or four times and the average number of bills per committee is about 25. The State Government Committee had 28 meetings and had referred to it some 190 bills.

I have introduced and worked to have passed a number of what I hope you consider worthwhile and constructive pieces of legislation. A partial list of the 112 bills sponsored by me is attached.

Also enclosed are some brief comments about matters of particular interest -- taxes, milk, pensions and consumer protection.

Though in many respects 1967 was an unfortunate year, the ground work was laid for some worthwhile legislation, and hopefully, politics will be submerged in favor of more constructive effort by the Legislature in 1968.

Your suggestions will be welcome and most helpful.

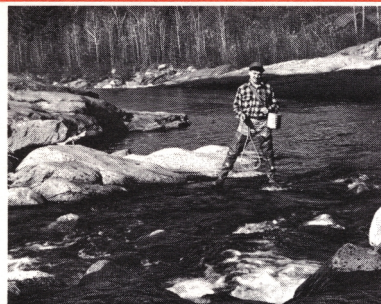

Dear Voter:

On October 25th and 26th editorials in the Pittsburgh Press pointed out the value of re-electing qualified incumbents.

"The Press strongly urges voters to support those candidates who have proved themselves in service and who have compiled a record of votes and legislative work which entitles them to voter approval."

"It makes little sense to throw out a seasoned man who ranks high in seniority, which is all-important, to install a new man who would have to start at the bottom."

"We all have too much at stake in Harrisburg that our best policy, as voters, is to support the best man, regardless of party."

Independent Democrats who desire good government should consider voting for Dr. George Haudenshield for re-election to his 5th term in the State Legislature.

1. He already has greater seniority than 80% of the House Members.
2. At 46 years of age Dr. Haudenshield is one of the youngest to have achieved this seniority. He has many years ahead to serve and Chair Key Committees.
3. He is a working member with an attendance and voting record of 97%.
4. He has sponsored over one hundred important bills and guided the passage of many more, including the \$4,500,000 Flood Appropriation for the Chartiers Valley.
5. He has worked for the passage of strip mine and clean streams legislation -- for highway safety bills -- for election reforms and constitutional amendments -- for health, welfare and social legislation. In education -- for increased subsidies to local districts, teachers' salaries, bus transportation for the safety of all children, for state scholarships, Community Colleges and Technical Schools.

We agree with the Pittsburgh Press that Independent Democrats should vote for the re-election of a capable, conscientious incumbent -- even if he is a Republican. Most issues are of local, not of political importance. The Democrats of the Chartiers Valley area will continue to get strong and effective representation.

It is not helpful or wise to trade a known, hard-working incumbent with top seniority for an unknown for purely political reasons.

TIME TO SLOW DOWN:

In the last few years tremendous progress has been made in many areas of social justice - and much is yet to be accomplished but

I BELIEVE that it is time to slow down - to evaluate and assimilate. Extreme liberalism has led to excesses that truly endanger our democratic processes.

American Liberals have gone overboard in their sentimental permissiveness to draft card and flag burning, to hecklers that in the name of free speech deny it to others, to professional student agitators who have twisted the right of free assembly into mob riot and destruction, to the concept of confrontation, not to secure justice, but as a deliberate attempt to destroy respect for law.

Along with the theory of permissiveness has come the concept that money - tax money - can cure all evils. Yet the more dollars that are hurriedly poured into more programs and the more government agencies established, the more unrest and discontent there is.

I BELIEVE that it is time to call a halt to needless government spending - particularly at the state and national level. Government is overgrown, with resulting duplication, confusion and waste. If taxes are to be raised let it be at the local level so communities can, where needed, and by their own choice, improve their schools, police departments, roads, etc.

We do not need to go backwards - but too little too late should not bring about too much too fast. Progress that is not built on the solid foundation of community support and acceptance may not only capsize but worse, open the door, as has happened in other countries, to fascism.

PROMISES SHOULD BE KEPT.

Politicians get kidded (and sometimes roasted) about Party Platforms that are ignored after election.

It is not always so - for example during the past two years nearly 500 bills have been referred to the State Government Committee. As Chairman I have the responsibility of analysis and review - included therein is whether or not the legislation is in line with the 1966 Platform Promises. Many times the Majority Leader or Governor's office also will pull out the Platform and check it.

The state publicity claims that 94.4% of the 1966 Republican State Platform promises have been fulfilled (53.7%) or started (46.7%). This may well be accurate - at least I can state that in my area every effort has been made to respect and achieve the Platform Promises made when I was re-elected in 1966.

(I mention this as) it is easy to promise and then forget or ignore.

I BELIEVE, and the State Republican Party believes, in doing what we say we will do.


Dear Friend:
